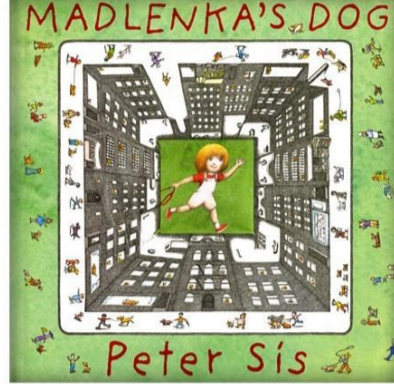

Clarke Speaker Series Events in October

October is full of interesting and exciting presentations at the Clarke. On



Thursday, October 17, internationally acclaimed illustrator, author, and filmmaker, Peter Sís will visit Mount Pleasant. Mr. Sís, a native of the former Czechoslovakia, defected to the United States in 1982. Soon after, he entered the children's literature business. Join the Clarke for this rare opportunity to engage with the Caldecott Honor and Hans Christian Andersen

Award winning author and illustrator of *Starry Messenger: Galileo Galilei*, *The Whipping Boy* (illustrator), *Madlenka*, and other beloved books.

Mr. Sís' presentation is made possible by the David M. and Eunice Sutherland Burgess Endowment.

Five days later, on **Tuesday, October 22**, the Clarke Historical Library, in conjunction with the Michigan State University Museum, will present *Alan Lomax: Folk Music in Michigan*. 2013 is the 75th anniversary of American folklorist Alan Lomax's historic field collecting trip in Michigan. We will celebrate this historic effort through a multimedia lecture and exhibit, which is displayed on the Park Library's Third Floor Exhibit Area.

This program is made possible, in part, by support from the Michigan Humanities Council.

Finally, on **Tuesday, October 29**, the Clarke has invited Deborah Thomas, program coordinator at the Library of Congress for the National Digital Newspaper Project, to present *Digitizing Newspapers in Michigan and Across America*. Ms. Thomas will discuss the Library of Congress's national program to digitize historic newspapers, as well as the role the Clarke Historical Library plays in this project as the Library's partnering organization in Michigan.

Ms. Thomas' presentation is made possible, in part, by travel funds made available through the National Endowment for the Humanities.

All events begin at 7:00 pm and are free and open to the public. A reception, to be held in the Clarke, will follow each event. The October 17 and 22 presentations will be held in the Park Library Auditorium. The October 29 discussion will take place in the Park Library Baber Room.

New Clarke Exhibit Opens

With two events, the Clarke officially opened our new exhibit, *Our Front Porch*. The Tuesday, September 24 event was discussion among the principal people involved in bringing WCMU's longtime music show to the airwaves. On Saturday, September 28, an *Our Front Porch* concert featuring artists Billy Strings and Don Julin was held. It started with a warm-up performance in the Clarke and later moved to the Moore Hall Kiva.
