# **DigMichNews Mini-Grant Finalists**

Applications have been received for the 2015-16 <u>Michigan Digital Newspaper Grant</u> <u>Program</u> and the selection committee has narrowed down the pool to five finalists. They are, in no particular order (sponsoring institutions are in parentheses):

- Clinton County Republican News (DeWitt Public Library)
- L'Anse Sentinel (Baraga County Public Library)
- Polish Daily News [English Edition] (Polish Mission/Orchard Lake Schools)
- Alpena News and Michigan Labor Journal (Alpena Public Library)
- Houghton Lake Resorter (Houghton Lake Public Library)



From January 19-26, the Clarke will host an election where the public gets to choose the finalist who will be awarded \$2,500. This money will allow the recipient to have up to 12,500 pages of previously microfilmed newspapers or 4,500 pages of unfilmed papers digitized and uploaded into the <u>CMU Online Digital Object Repository (CONDOR)</u>. Voting will be in the form of tweets on Twitter and picture postcards mailed to the Clarke. More information about voting will be available as we head into the new year.
